SIX YEARS AT HARD LABOR

R. A. Bernier Will Serve Long Sentence For Breaking Into Box Car.

R. A. Bernier, who was recently arrested here for stealing from a Chicago & Northwestern railway box car in the local yards, pleaded guilty before Circuit Judge B. E. Park at Stevens Point and received a sentence of six years at hard labor in the state penitentiary at Waupun.


