## THE FINAL SCHOOL TERM

School Work Resumed Monday after Short Rest.

High School Enrollment is 136 Students.

Work in the city schools was resumed Monday after a week's vacation for the final term of the school year. The attendance is large in all departments and several of the buildings are being taxed to the limit. The work in the schools has been exceptionally successful and satisfactory this year, and is progressing smoothly in the grades as well as the high school, and Supt. Gile and his able corps of teachers deserve great credit for their most efficient work. The schools are not only doing all that can be done for the advancement of the pupils, but by winning the interest and approval of parents and public spirited people, are laying the foundation for increased usefulness in the future. The value of a school which has the energetic support and commendation of the entire community cannot be over-estimated.

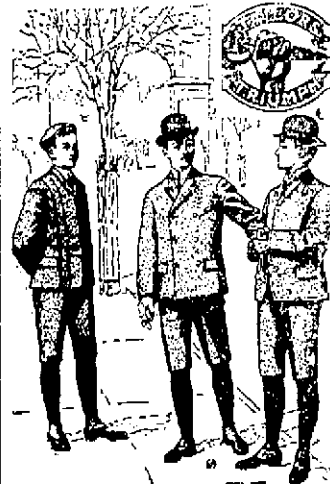
