**UNCLE SAM ASKS  
ABOUT 'CHEESE TRUST'**

It is well known that Marshfield has developed rapidly as a center for the production of cheese, but at the same time the facilities for marketing cheese have not increased proportionally. Notwithstanding hearty co-operation from all sides, two efforts to establish cheese boards have failed owing to the unwieldy nature of the organization planned, and changes come about so rapidly that every six months sees a new lineup in the cheese world.

Future developments in the projected investigation by the government will be watched with interest.

**WHO AGREED TO  
A COMPROMISE?**

Did Mr. Ambrose Say He Would Not Prosecute? Direct Issue of Fact in Indignant Denial of Preacher's Story on Part of C. E. Blodgett.

Following the publication in this paper last week of a statement from Rev. F. Halsey Ambrose that there had been "no compromise" on the saloon question, C. E. Blodgett issued a statement from which it appears that the stories differ substantially. Mr. Blodgett quotes reported exact statements of Mr. Ambrose, in which he alleges that Mr. Ambrose said "if that arrangement is carried out I will not prosecute."

Mr. Blodgett's statement is as follows:

"Inasmuch as Rev. F. Halsey Ambrose has published a statement in which he denies having made an agreement with me in regard to the Sunday closing of saloons in Marshfield, I feel that in justice to myself and my position in the recent meeting of liquor dealers, which acted upon my statement then made to them, to publish the facts of my agreement with Rev. Ambrose.

"In my two interviews with Mr. Ambrose, one at his church in the forenoon and one at my office in the afternoon, I stated to him my position in regard to Sunday closing and showed him that the closing of saloons on Sunday would result in a practical ruin of my hotel business and the driving away from Marshfield about seventy-five traveling men each week with a consequent loss of their trade to the business men of town, amounting in all lines to a large sum of money each week. I urged Mr. Ambrose to make some reasonable arrangement for a limited closing on Sundays. I made the proposition to him substantially as it was later adopted by the meeting of the saloon-keepers and he stated to me that he could not protect us from prosecution, but that the proposition was satisfactory to him and that he would not prosecute. His exact words were: "That arrangement is perfectly satisfactory to me, and if that arrangement is carried out I will not prosecute."

"After I had submitted this proposition to the meeting of the local saloon-keepers and they had adopted it, I reported that fact to Rev. Ambrose in his church and he again stated that the arrangement was perfectly satisfactory to him and that he would not prosecute. At this time he also stated to me, "You are entitled to a lot of credit for fixing this up." C. E. Blodgett."
