### AN AMERICAN PLAY

It was our pleasure and privilege to attend the first night's performance of David W. Griffith's motion picture spectacle, "The Birth of a Nation," at the Adler opera house on Friday. One should not be ashamed to confess that there were moments in the play when speech would have been impossible, and others when the screen seemed to be a little misty. Aside from its affecting situations, however, the play had many more climaxes when the impulse, instead of to weep, was to stand up on one's chair and cheer the flag, or for the night riders, which ever the case might be.

Briefly, the spectacle is a pictorial drama of the civil war and reconstruction days. It shows, true to life, the peaceful southern life before the secession; the cordial relations between friends living north and south; the shock of war; Sherman's march to the sea; the burning of Atlanta; thrilling battle scenes, accompanied by all the sounds and sights thereof; several pictures in which Abraham Lincoln and a radical leader named Stoneman take part; the assassination of President Lincoln, true to the last detail; and the horrors of reconstruction, when under the leadership of carpet-baggers from the north the newly freed slaves gained the upper hand. Lastly, but by no means least, comes the most thrilling of all, a series of episodes depicting the second uprising of the South in the Ku Klux Klan, an organization of southern chivalry for the protection of its women and of its white rights.

Words, at least a few words, do not suffice to do justice to the picture. It takes nearly three hours; the action is continuous and exciting; and a great effect is produced by a symphony orchestra of twenty-five skilled musicians, who with a balanced variety of instruments carry the audience through the whole gamut of human emotions from "Dixie" and "Swanee River" to "Nearer My God to Thee."

Contrary to reports which were industriously circulated without expense to Mr. Adler, the symphony orchestra was a genuine imported orchestra and was not made up of local players. At that, we see no reason why anyone should have sneered beforehand at the music or the play either, even if our own competent orchestra had happened to furnish the inspiring strains of the "Star Spangled Banner" and certain other pieces with which they are perfectly familiar. It seems to us that in putting on "The Birth of a Nation" with such great success Manager Adler has demonstrated that he wants to do the right thing by the public—while on the other hand, the public, coming from near and far, must have shown him that it appreciates good attractions.

### WALL PAPER FROM LUMBER

Now They Talk of Using Mill Waste For Home Decoration.

The possibility of utilizing Wisconsin lumber waste for the manufacture of wall paper is being studied by Dr. Otto Kress of the forest products laboratory, university of Wisconsin, who was recently appointed chairman of the committee on kraft paper of the American Pulp and Paper association.

Millions of dollars worth of lumber is going to waste each year because of the failure to utilize a vast amount of what is now commonly called "waste" lumber, according to Dr. Kress. Because of the keen competition between European nations and the United States in the manufacture of paper the association has appointed throughout the country various committees to work for more economical and scientific results in the paper industry. If this waste, which is now without value, can be utilized, a decided step will have been made in the science of paper making.

### SHORT ANSWER FOR AUSTRIA

Washington, D. C., Dec. 18.—Having practically completed what is said to be an almost abrupt dismissal of Austria's arguments concerning the sinking of the Ancona, Secretary Lansing Saturday afternoon gave out the text of Austria's note. Its most significant feature is its insistence on discussion of the evidence and the principles involved.

It asks almost plaintively, why America refuses an exchange of correspondence which it has conducted with another government in other cases.

Secretary Lansing has prepared a vigorous message. The note is now in the president's hands for final approval. It is authoritatively stated the reply is brief, sharp and permits of no further quibbling.

The situation between Austria and the government is characterized in official circles as "very grave."


