NEW JEWELRY STORE SOON TO BE OPENED

Marshfield is to have a new jewelry store, located in the Adler block on the east side of Central avenue. The new proprietor, J. E. Buoy, formerly of Springfield, Ill., arrived in town Monday with his wife and three children and they are now moving into the A. J. Campbell residence, 800 South Vine street. While in Springfield, Mr. Buoy was engaged in the business of manufacturing jewelry, and it is this profession which he intends to follow in Marshfield. Mr. Buoy has secured a location in the Adler building which is now being thoroughly renovated. A new modern plate glass front is being put into the building and the ceiling has been covered with new metal. The color scheme of the new interior decoration will be robin's egg blue which will contrast harmoniously with mahogany show cases and fixtures. The latest improved machinery pertaining to watch making and repairing and to jewelry making will be installed according to a statement made by Mr. Buoy. The jewelry stock carried, Mr. Buoy states, will include a large amount of hand manufactured jewelry in original designs and patterns. Equipment will be such that all kinds of jewelry will be made right on the premises so that no work need be sent out of the city for repair parts. Jewelry will be made for customers according to their own ideas and designs, he states further. Mr. Buoy has already been appointed the official watch inspector for the Northwestern railroad and the Soo. Work of this character will be accepted on and after Saturday, July 24th. Announcement of the formal opening will appear in this paper later.
