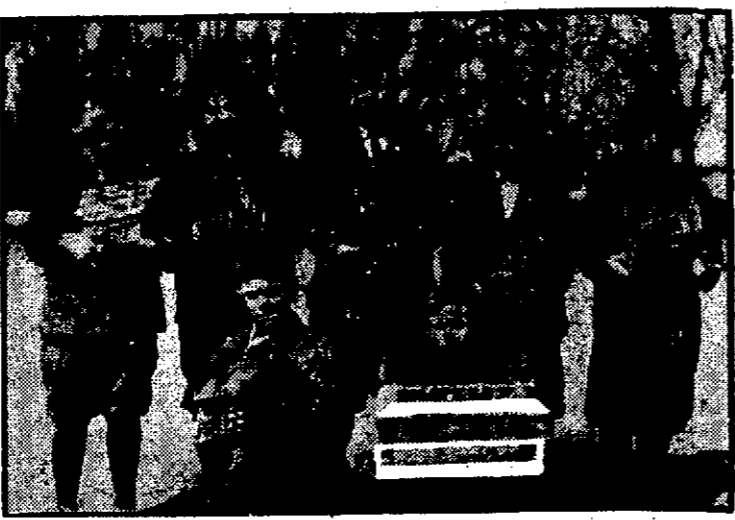

Striking Students at Flambeau Cause Big Shakeup in School

CHIPPewa FALLS, Wis.—Resignation of Principal S. A. Dekey, discontinuance of the insuring ninth grade and the reorganization of Riverside school of Flambeau under one teacher today marked the climax of a strike of pupils against an order of the school board that the school would be in session six days a week throughout June. The board decided upon extending the school year to complete work done under an unlicensed teacher. Six of the ninth grade eight members objected, refused to attend school and brought about controversy which resulted in the dismissal of the grade and the resignation of the principal.

The pupils went on a strike last Friday for the following reasons set forth by the children themselves: 1. Pupils do not want to go to school throughout the month of June as was recently decided by the board. 2. The pupils refused to go to school on Saturdays which was also asked of them. 3. The teacher failed to work a problem in algebra after second attempt at working it. 4. Without sufficient cause privileges which the pupils enjoyed for a period of seven months were revoked by the new teacher immediately after her arrival.

All Wisconsin High School Music Contest Opens May 9

Entries Must Be Registered Before April 24, Ruling

The all Wisconsin high school music contest will be held May 8 and 9. More than 23 school applications have been received at the office of P. W. Dykstra, of the department of public school music. Entries must be registered before April 24 and they must fall in the following classes: Glee club, mixed chorus, orchestra, band, solo, boys and girls, piano and violin. Judgments will be made on rhythm, tone, intonation, technical efficiency, enunciation, interpretation, appearance, selection, balance, instrumentation and appearance.

First and second prizes will be awarded in each event. In the solo events a gold pin will be given as first prize and a silver pin as second. Loving cups will be awarded winners in group events. To the high school winning the largest number of points the Wisconsin High School music championship trophy, a large silver loving cup, will be given. The winning school keeps the cup for one year and if it is won a second time the cup may become the permanent property of the school.

Championship points are awarded as follows: Girl's Glee club, first place, 8; second place, 4. Mixed chorus, first, 10; second, 5. Band, first, 10; second, 5. All solo events receive 4 points for first place and 2 for second.

More than 500 students are expected to compete in the contest.
