

EMPLOYMENT OF CHILDREN UNDER 14 IS FORBIDDEN

Marshfield employers have received notice from the state industrial commission at Madison, calling attention to the new federal child labor law, which becomes effective on September 1 of this year.

The Wisconsin child labor law has one provision which may be construed as conflicting with the federal law. This is the clause which permits the employment of children 8 1/2 hours per day, providing they are not required to work on Saturday afternoons.

Most employers in the state faithfully observe the child labor law, and very few violate it intentionally. There are employers, however, who are careless about verifying the ages of children who go to work for them.

CALF CLUB STARTED BY WOOD CO. BANKS

A calf club for the boys and girls will be conducted by the Wood county bankers.

Any boy or girl between the ages of ten and eighteen may enter this club. They must first decide on the breed and age of calf that they want.

The banks of the county agree to loan money for this purpose at the rate of six per cent. Boy or girl to sign note with some reasonable party.

Calves will be purchased by banks through the Wood County Agricultural school, and turned over to the purchaser.

The boy or girl getting calf agrees to give it good care and bring it to town to be sold at some time in the spring of 1918.

Each boy or girl should keep a record of cost of raising calf. In this way they can tell how much actual profit they are making.

Arrangements to join the club should be made by May first. Talk this plan over and make arrangements with your banker.

This plan will put more and better cattle in the county. What is more important, it will give the boys and girls more interest in livestock and in the farm in general.—W. W. Clark.
