Blodgett, who has donated the flag to the city. The flag is 10x20 feet in size and is an emblem long needed by the city to show its respect to the departed boys over there.

Memorial Day proved to be a "Jonah day" for John Vanderberg of Mannville. While running his auto while he was under the influence of liquor spelled ruin for his car and compensatory damages to the car which he struck while under the weather. The accident happened near Columbia park, corner West A and Chestnut. He ran into a car owned by William Lutz of the Town of Day. Vanderberg was arrested and in Judge Andrews court was fined \$25 and costs and settled with Mr. Lutz for \$100.

James H. Woertendye, statesman, orator, lawyer, said to be one of the ablest men on the anti-liquor platform will speak in the Marshfield Evangelical church next Sunday. He will speak Friday afternoon in the Congregational church at Vesper. The subject of Mr. Woertendye's address is "Over the Top," and is said to be along patriotic lines.

A delightful dancing party was given by the Knights of Columbus at the armory last Wednesday evening for members of the council and those participating in the presentation of the play, "America Awake." Music was furnished by the Imperial orchestra and one of the best times of the dancing season was enjoyed by those present on that evening.
