HIGHS IN TOUGH

BATTLE—6 TO 0

In a game which was hard fought and replete with wonderful playing on the part of both teams, Marshfield Saturday defeated Eau Claire in this city by a score of 6 to 0. Many thought that the game would end in a scoreless tie, but in the closing minutes of the last quarter, McCarr, speedy quarterback for the locals, succeeded in slipping over the line for the much needed score. The attempt to kick goal failed.

The Eau Claire team is a real football machine, but in comparison with the locals, our boys seem to have the Indian sign on most anything that they will run up against this fall. Marshfield at all times, and with few exceptions had their opponents on the jump and hustling all the time. Most of the time the battle was fought in Eau Claire territory with the locals on the verge of scoring several times. Eau Claire's big ground gainer was the forward pass with which they completely baffled the locals on several occasions.

Saturday's game proved conclusively that the local High school is decidedly in the running for the Central Wisconsin state championship this fall and if they keep up the splendid work of the past two games, Marshfield will no doubt be the home of a champion football team ere the season is over.

If Saturday's game can be taken as a criterion for the season's showing, chances for a general clean-up of the teams scheduled for play look bright. MARSHFIELD

TO BE FILMED

E. S. Bailey, treasurer for the Yellowstone Trail association with headquarters at Aberdeen, S. D., is in receipt of a letter advising him of a motion picture film which is going to be made by this association. This film will include scenes along the Yellowstone Trail from Chicago to the Pacific coast and is to consist of 12,000 feet of film which is to be divided among six states and the state of Wisconsin is apportioned 2,000

feet. Marshfield and our surrounding country on this trail is allotted 225 feet.

As there will be quite a heavy expense connected with this filming the matter was referred to the Board of Commerce and they at a meeting of the executive board decided in favor of the proposition and took hold of the matter and forwarded a contract to the Yellowstone Trail association for the amount proportioned to the city of Marshfield and vicinity. Part of the money, it is proposed at this time, will be likely raised by popular subscription.
